Backyard Winter Bird Survey participants report any bird species visiting their yard and/or feeders in New Hampshire on the second weekend of February. Originally begun 50 years ago as the "Cardinal-Tufted Titmouse Survey," it was expanded in 1987 to gather information on the distribution and abundance of all backyard winter bird species in New Hampshire.

<u>New in 2018!</u>

The reporting form has a new look. We've also added Wild Turkey, Carolina Wren, Eastern Bluebird, and Common Redpoll. How do you like it?

When to watch

February 10 and 11 **only**. Watch and count the birds in your yard at any time during the weekend.

How long to watch

Watch as little or as long as you wish during the survey weekend. Be sure to record the total number of hours you observed. Approximate as closely as possible. For example, if you were home all day, but only watched for five minutes every hour, your time will be 45 minutes.

How to count birds and squirrels

Record only the maximum number of each species seen at one time. Do not add to your total each time you see a bird at the feeder. For example, at 10:00AM you see six Blue Jays, at 2:00PM you count seven, and at 5:00PM you count four, your survey total for Blue Jays is seven. Even if you did not see any birds, mark the survey card accordingly and send it in just the same. Count squirrels the same way.

What birds are in my "backyard"?

Count and record whatever birds you can see from your backyard – they could be at your feeder, flying overhead, or swimming in the river bordering your yard. If you can see it while standing in your house or yard, you can report it. If you watch from more than one residence, use separate forms for each location.

Additional and unusual species

Use the blank lines to record any additional species observed. These are often uncommon species. Please include a detailed description of the bird's appearance and behavior. Photographs are always helpful. E-mail them to <u>bwbs@nhaudubon.org</u>; be sure to include your name and address in your e-mail and note on your survey form that you've e-mailed a photo. Without this documentation, unusual reports may not be included in the final tally.

Birds you can't identify

If you don't know the names of all the birds visiting your yard, you can still participate, but please record only the species you can identify.

Confusing species

Please be sure you can distinguish between similar species, such as Purple and House Finches, Chipping and American Tree Sparrows, and the Sharp-Shinned and Cooper's Hawks. A current field guide can help. Remember that the House Finch is more common than the Purple Finch (except in Coos County) and Chipping Sparrows will be in their winter plumage. Send descriptive details of Chipping Sparrow or Purple Finch sightings.

Survey results

The survey reports are computerized over the spring and summer, with final interpretation in the fall. All participants receive a copy of the results with next year's forms when they are mailed in January.
