Ossipee Nighthawk Research

In 2018 NH Audubon and the NH Chapter of The Nature Conservancy partnered with the Field Naturalist Program at the University of Vermont to utilize a graduate student to conduct bird and vegetation surveys in the Ossipee Pine Barrens. We were delighted to welcome Jason Mazurowski as that student. Thanks to Jason, we confirmed more Common Nighthawk nests in a single year in the area than we have before. 
The Ossipee Pine Barrens Preserve represents one of the only known locations in New Hampshire where Common Nighthawks breed in their natural habitat. Although *Project Nighthawk* has been active in the Ossipee area, the ability to confirm breeding and continuously monitor nest activity has been limited. The goals for my 2018 study were to confirm breeding, monitor activity throughout the season, locate each nest site, and then measure habitat features at each nest location. Gathering as much information as possible on the last remaining natural habitat in New Hampshire is crucial to informing management actions on pine barrens habitat.

With the outstanding support of NH Audubon's volunteers, and Becky Suomala's expert guidance, we were able to identify probable nest locations early in the season. Several nights a week, I revisited possible nests to watch for females taking off and landing. These observations allowed me to confirm breeding at every possible site, as well as pinpoint where the nests were located. Behavioral cues from the nest pair, and some knowledge about the timing of nest selection also gave us an idea of which nests may have been successful. Two confirmed nests and one probable nest were located within the Preserve, and two additional nest sites were confirmed on Depot Rd. in the adjacent town of Tamworth. Two fledged chicks were seen begging for food at one of the Depot Rd. clearcuts, and one fledged chick was observed at the West Branch Pine Barren nest. With the help of Charlie Nims and Tin Mountain's Avian Interns, we were also able to investigate nighthawk activity in the Mt. Washington Valley. As a result, an additional nest was confirmed on Black Cap Mountain, and another possible nest site was suspected near The Nature Conservancy's Bear Paw tract near the Maine border.

In August, after migration was underway and the nests were abandoned, I revisited each confirmed site and collected vegetation measurements. The data I collected will be included in a report to NH Audubon and The Nature Conservancy along with a detailed description of nighthawk nesting habitat and management objectives to improve nighthawk nesting habitat in the pine barrens.

CONCORD



The Concord area had three confirmed nesting locations. A nest on Steeplegate Mall was confirmed thanks to new volunteers Alex Gomez and Bob Reynolds whose many watches allowed us to confirm nesting by behavior.

Clough Mill Rd., a new site just over the border in Pembroke, had a late nest with one chick, estimated hatch date 7/9/18. We could not confirm fledging due to lack of access. Concord Airport had no activity early on, but an adult (female?) was flushed from the ground by NH Fish and Game personnel. A second bird (undoubtedly a large chick) ran off through the grass.

There was a possible nest at White Mountain Imaging, with a raspy male (same as last year) and female landing on the roof. After a roof check in late June revealed no nest, activity shifted to EJP pipe company, then stopped.

The Broken Ground area had no activity again this year, nor did other sites that were once active (i.e. Downtown, NHTI, Pembroke Sand & Gravel).

The Ossipee area was the bright spot this year with confirmed nesting in four locations, thanks to Jason Mazurowski's many watches.

Depot Rd., Tamworth had two nests, one with two fledged chicks videoed by Jason.

There was a confirmed nest at Thicket NE at the same site as 2016 and 2017, with female and

The PEENT was held on June 29 this year. The only nighthawks were at the Brookside Dr. stump dump, which had a male flyover, and possibly a second bird.

The Rt. 114 log landing had one or two birds early in June (feeding?), but none on the coordinated watch. Although there was activity at Dunbar Hill Rd. at the end of May, they may have been migrants as there was no further nighthawk activity. There was also no activity at Grey Ledges or the settling ponds near Brookridge.

Keene held two watches on 6/14 and 6/26 with a total of three adults seen. There was nesting behavior by a male and probable female at Elliot Hall, but no nest was found despite several roof searches. At West St., there was a female with two newly hatched chicks on 6/22, but they were not present on 6/26. Nest failure may have been


