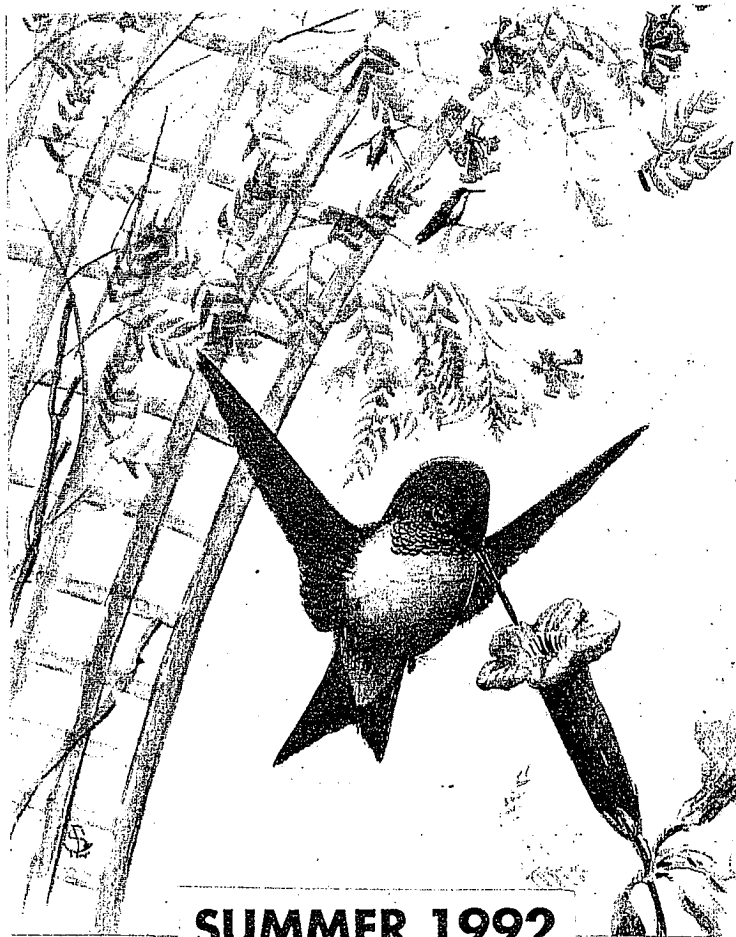

• Quincy Bog Natural Area •

The Quincy Bog Natural Area in Rumney was acquired by a group of local residents in the fall of 1974 to insure its preservation as a natural area. The Rumney Ecological Systems, a non-profit corporation, and its directors administer the 46 acre tract. Since acquisition the Rumney group has, with the cooperation of The Nature Conservancy, purchased two buffer tracts which border the bog.

The bog area is a diversified environment with pond, sedge meadow, red maple and alder swamp, sandy flood plain, granite outcrop, and cut-over woodland typical of central New Hampshire. It is home to a wide variety of plants, mammals, reptiles, and more than 115 species of birds. American Bittern, Great Blue Heron, ducks, raptors, shorebirds, thrushes, warblers, and Red-winged Blackbird have all been observed there.

To find the Quincy Bog Natural Area, locate the Smith Bridge Road just west of Plymouth on Route 3A/25. Stay on Quincy Road past the airport for about four miles. Turn right between the stone pillars across from the ball field, then take the first left to the end of the road. The Nature Center is just a few yards down the path leading from the parking area. Summer Season

June 1 through July 31, 1992

A cold, wet June and the fourth coldest July on record did not seem to hinder our nesting birds—the summer of 1992 was a well-reported season, and most of the news was encouraging. For example, many more species on the Breeding Bird Survey (BBS) showed increases than decreases. Common Loons were recorded in record-breaking numbers thanks to the efforts of the Loon Preservation Committee; the Endangered Species Program reported progress for almost all of the threatened and endangered species it monitors in the state; and a good variety of rarities were sighted. My congratulations to all reporters.

Tempering the good news were significant declines the BBS showed for Tree and Barn swallows, Northern Flicker, and Eastern Kingbird, as well as for those species that have exhibited long-term declines (Least Flycatcher, American Redstart, Field Sparrow, etc.). Also, the New Hampshire BBS data echoes the national decrease in “our” Neotropical migrants, with low totals for Wood Thrush, Veery, Ovenbird, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, Scarlet Tanager, and Northern Oriole. Details on all species are in the following accounts, or on file at Audubon House.

Plenty of rare birds kept the adrenaline flowing and the interest up during what is often thought to be the dullest field season. The highlights were an adult **Yellow-crowned Night-Heron**, a male **Ruddy Duck**, an **Upland Sandpiper** in Pittsburg, **Red-necked Phalarope** in Exeter, **Royal Tern** (the BOTS—“bird of the season”), **Cerulean Warbler**, two **Yellow-throated Warblers**, and a male **Blue Grosbeak**. Also, reports of Fish Crow and Cerulean Warblers appeared in *American Birds* but were not received by ASNH, so they do not occur in this publication.

Again, I want to emphasize that you observers are doing a great job—please keep it up (and maybe even do more?). We’re gaining rapidly on the editing backlog, so watch for the Summer, 1993 *New Hampshire Bird Records* soon.

Finally, I am still waiting for someone to collect his or her ice cream (see Summer, 1990) while I investigate for Philadelphia Vireos. If you want to contact me, write 53 Baptist Hill Road, Canterbury, NH 03224.

About the Cover

Loons through Herons

The 504 adult Common Loons tallied by the Loon Preservation Committee produced 89 young this year. Both figures are all-time records, but more significant, the number of lakes with nesting pairs was also at an all-time high of 64—almost twice what it was when the LPC began its work 17 years ago. Random sightings also back up the conclusion that loons were more widespread than in past years.

Three apparently new sites for Pied-billed Grebe (Jackson, Wentworth, and Hebron) are encouraging for this scarce breeder. Wilson's Storm-Petrels are common to abundant off our shores in the summer, but it is somewhat unusual to see them from land. The few Double-crested Cormorants reported were probably only a fraction of the total for this dramatically increasing species.

For the second consecutive year, more than a dozen American Bitterns were reported, happily above the norm for recent summers. Great Egrets do not nest in New Hampshire, but their increase as a breeding species in Massachusetts probably explains the relatively early dates and large numbers reported. An adult **Yellow-crowned Night-Heron** is a rarity for New Hampshire, though Great Bay seems to be one of the best places to find them.

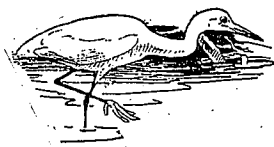

Waterfowl through Hawks

The 101 Canada Geese on the Breeding Bird Survey demolished 1990's record of 48, and their numbers elsewhere lead this editor to wonder if they are becoming resident "condo geese" and thereby a problem. A pair of Green-winged Teal in the Hampton marshes in early June is uncharacteristic for this traditionally northern breeder. The usually more common teal—Blue-winged—went unreported. The family of American Black Ducks at Nancy Pond (elevation: 3,000 feet) was the highest duck family ever recorded by Tudor Richards in 50 years of birding in the White Mountains. An unseasonable Ruddy Duck on July 2 is only the second summer record of this species for the state.

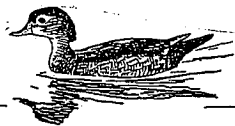
The Endangered Species Program noted a decline in Osprey chicks from 24 in 1991 to 15 in 1992, but the evidence of three nests in the Great Bay area was most encouraging. The Bald Eagle nest at Lake Umbagog produced two young, though only one survived. More important, observers spotted 14 other individual eagles at Umbagog between April 1 and September 30; these included two adults that appeared to take up residence at the southern end of the lake.

The only noteworthy Northern Harrier reports were several sightings of a male in possible breeding territory in Brookline and an apparent wanderer in Kensington. A migrant harrier was noted in Gilsum on July 29. Seven Sharp-shinned Hawks represent a better-than-average tally during the nesting season, as do the five Cooper's Hawks, four of which were coastal, a region not thought to be the center of the species' nesting range.

For the third consecutive year, at least one Merlin at Lake Umbagog provided strong evidence that this species is nesting in our state, but proof is still lacking. Peregrine Falcons in New Hampshire produced five young from seven nests (fewer than recent summers), but the regionwide (Maine, Vermont, and New Hampshire) total of 25 pairs represents a 25% increase over 1991.

Grouse through Shorebirds

Not many summer seasons have seen all four species of Galliformes (grouse, turkeys, etc.) reported. The Northern Bobwhite on the Milan BBS was unusually far north (and almost certainly a captive-reared bird since this species is not known to survive year-round in the wild in New Hampshire).

The eight Common Snipe on the BBS routes tied the record low, which is inexplicable in that the record high of 30 was within the last 10 years. The ESP believes the Upland Sandpipers at Pease produced at least 10 young from 10 nests, and the species' migratory numbers at the end of July were what we have come to expect (spectacular nonetheless). An "Uppy" in Pittsburg on June 28 was unusual for both time and place.

Notable among migrant shorebirds were three Pectoral Sandpipers (unusual for July); the lack of Black-bellied Plover, Ruddy Turnstone, and Least Sandpiper reports; and the lack of inland sightings away from Lake Umbagog. The June 12 Short-billed Dowitchers were northbound. A Red-necked Phalarope in Exeter was unusual for the location but not the date—their migration (normally offshore) extends well into June.

Gulls through Owls

The **Royal Tern** has been an extremely rare visitor to our state (only a handful of records exist), and I believe prior sightings were all storm-related. This season's sighting was not, however; and it was accompanied by detailed and thorough documentation that leaves no doubt as to the identification (and makes the editor's job easier). Two adult Laughing Gulls on June 6 were unseasonal but could have been unsuccessful nesters from Maine or Massachusetts. The Common Tern is still struggling, but 25 fledglings represents modest success.

Six Yellow-billed Cuckoos is a higher number than for most summers and is especially surprising since Black-billed Cuckoo numbers were not particularly high. This fact was reflected in the BBS results as well and perhaps indicates that these two closely related species do not respond to the same environmental conditions.

Nighthawk through Flycatchers

We are encouraged by reports of 100 Common Nighthawks from 15 towns, especially given that the ESP did not conduct a formal survey this year. On the other hand, many volunteers surveying for Whip-poor-wills in the White Mountains sent their sightings to *NHBR*, resulting in at least 36 birds reported (compared to 15 and six the last two summers). Downy and Hairy Woodpeckers were near their all-time BBS records, the Yellow-bellied Sapsucker total was the highest since 1971, and the 37 Pileated Woodpeckers smashed the record of 22 set just last year. Meanwhile, the Northern Flicker continues to be recorded in low numbers on the BBS. For the first time in many, many years, no Red-headed or Red-bellied Woodpeckers were reported.

On the BBS routes, the 77 Least Flycatchers were not far from the record low of 75 set last year, and the Eastern Kingbird numbers are also down. Conversely, the Great Crested Flycatcher and Eastern Phoebe set new record highs, with the phoebe breaking the old record of 225 by 25! Willow Flycatchers in Bethlehem and Whitefield were unusually far north for that species. The only Horned Larks were coastal.

Swallows through Creeper

Despite generally good weather and an excellent crew of observers, Tree and Barn Swallows continue to be recorded in near-record-low numbers on the BBS. The Cliff Swallow rebounded somewhat this year, nearly reaching its median. Purple Martins were noted at two of their strongholds—perhaps the only two.

Gray Jay reports were more numerous than in recent summers. The three Fish Crows along the coast were most surprising in their location because this puzzling species seems to occur farther inland most frequently. A Common Raven nest in Raymond confirmed that species as a breeder in the southeast part of the state. New BBS records were set for Tufted Titmouse and Red-breasted Nuthatch, with the last four years for the Red-breasted being 48, 52, 46, and this year's 65.

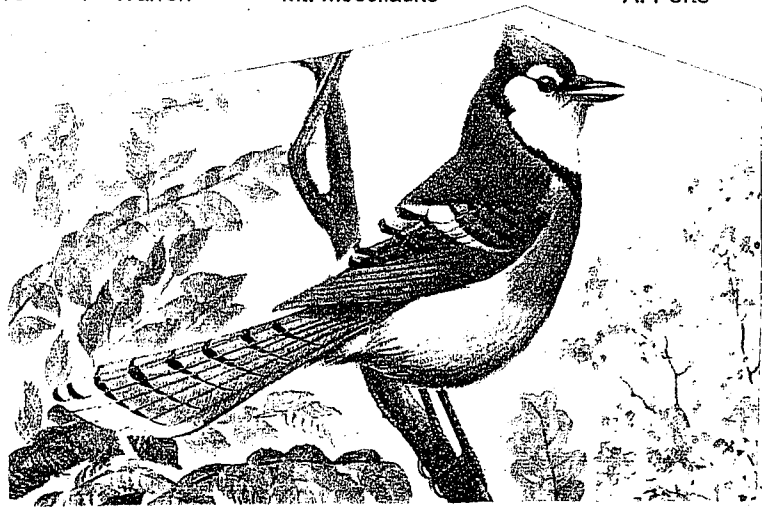

Wrens through Vireos

Carolina Wrens were found nesting in Concord after last year's first confirmed nests in Hudson and Durham. Two other reports came from the BBS routes, including one unusually far north on the Milan route. A Winter Wren on East Side Drive in Concord was surprisingly urban for that species. The 26 Eastern Bluebirds from the BBS routes tied the record high.

The only Gray-cheeked Thrush report was of a bird on Smart's Mountain that responded to a tape during a survey designed for that species. The 327 Veerys and the 29 Swainson's Thrushes on the BBS were both the highest totals since 1983. Elsewhere, Swainson's Thrushes were well-reported, including the now-expected birds in New London. A dozen Brown Thrashers—surprisingly high—may have reflected more effort at looking for this declining species. The Northern Mockingbird continued an annual tradition by breaking its BBS record again.

An organized survey located nine American Pipits on Mount Washington. The single Warbling Vireo report was likely due to observer apathy rather than a scarcity of birds. This editor can find no explanation for why the Solitary Vireo went from a BBS total of 70 in 1991 to a total of 35 this year. Red-eyed Vireo still vies with American Robin as the most numerous species on the BBS routes, but it does so now while being recorded in historically low numbers (651 birds this year).

The 462 European Starlings on the BBS was a significantly lower total than last year's record low (610). Is this a hopeful sign, or are observers slighting them?

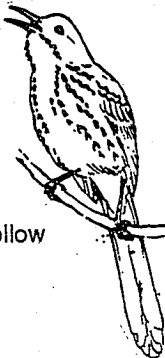

Warblers

All of the Blue-winged Warbler reports were away from their well-known nesting areas in the coastal plain, and it's now an expected species in the BBS. Two Golden-winged Warblers in Hanover were paired with Blue-winged Warblers. Both apparently nested and fledged young. This is the only nesting for either of these species that this editor is aware of away from the coastal plain. A hybrid (Brewster's) was noted in Dunbarton.

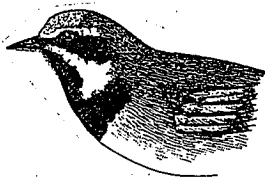
A Tennessee Warbler singing on June 9 in Sandwich could have been a local nester or a late migrant. Two different **Yellow-throated Warblers** were observed in the Connecticut River Valley. One was a male in Walpole, which had been present since May 18, and the other was a female present for almost a week in Lebanon. These reports are provocative considering that a number of species (such as Red-bellied Woodpecker) have lately expanded their ranges from southern Connecticut north along the river valley. Observers in that area should keep a close watch out for this species in future summers.

Another rare sighting was the **Cerulean Warbler** at Pawtuckaway State Park, particularly intriguing since a Cerulean Warbler was reported there several years ago. The June 3 Blackpoll Warbler in Lebanon was definitely a late migrant (and typical of this species). Mourning Warblers in Hanover, Moultonborough, and Walpole were south of their usual nesting range.

Based on the BBS numbers, the warblers as a group in New Hampshire are doing very well; species on the increase outnumber those on the decrease by more than two to one. The species on the rise include Blue-winged, Yellow, Black-throated Blue, Yellow-rumped, Blackburnian, and Ovenbird; species I'd call "way up" are Northern Parula, Black-throated Green, and Pine. Those species on the decline include Chestnut-sided, Northern Waterthrush, and Common Yellowthroat. The American Redstart is the only warbler species at record low numbers.

Tanager through Finches

An adult male **Blue Grosbeak** photographed in Hollis was one of the summer's highlights. The 76 Northern Cardinals smashed the all-time BBS record of 54 set in 1990 (incorrectly reported in 1991; see Corrections Page in this issue). Indigo Buntings in Columbia, Dixville (BBS), and Stratford (BBS) were somewhat farther north than usual. Many more Savannah Sparrows are nesting in the state than this season's meager reports indicate (five northern BBS routes tallied 25 Savannahs). Dark-eyed Juncos are common nesting birds in the mountains and points north, yet the reports here would lead the casual observer to assume that they are more common in the southern part of the state.

Other sparrow sightings worth mentioning were a Vesper Sparrow on the Milan BBS route (this species has become quite scarce as a nester) and low numbers of the Rufous-sided Towhees and Field Sparrows on the BBS (tempered by their being recorded on 14 and 11 routes, respectively). A Seaside Sparrow was tracked down in the coastal salt marshes by one intrepid observer.

Eastern Meadowlarks are declining, but three reports surely are not indicative of their true population level. Meadowlarks totaled 21 birds on 10 BBS routes. A post-breeding flock of 80 Bobolinks was noteworthy but should be a repeatable phenomena in many parts of the state. Because the Orchard Oriole is a very rare breeder in the state, the season's two widely separated sightings are welcome. The 100 Northern Orioles on the BBS was the second-lowest total ever. Surprisingly, the record high of 215 was recorded as recently as 1984. Is this species cyclic?

A lone Red Crossbill on the Milan BBS was this season's only crossbill report. Pine Siskins are erratic in the extreme (at least from our point of view). The BBS record totals are 204 in 1973, 51 in 1992, (1991 only had two!), 36 in 1980, and 35 in 1990. This summer they were more widespread than in most years.

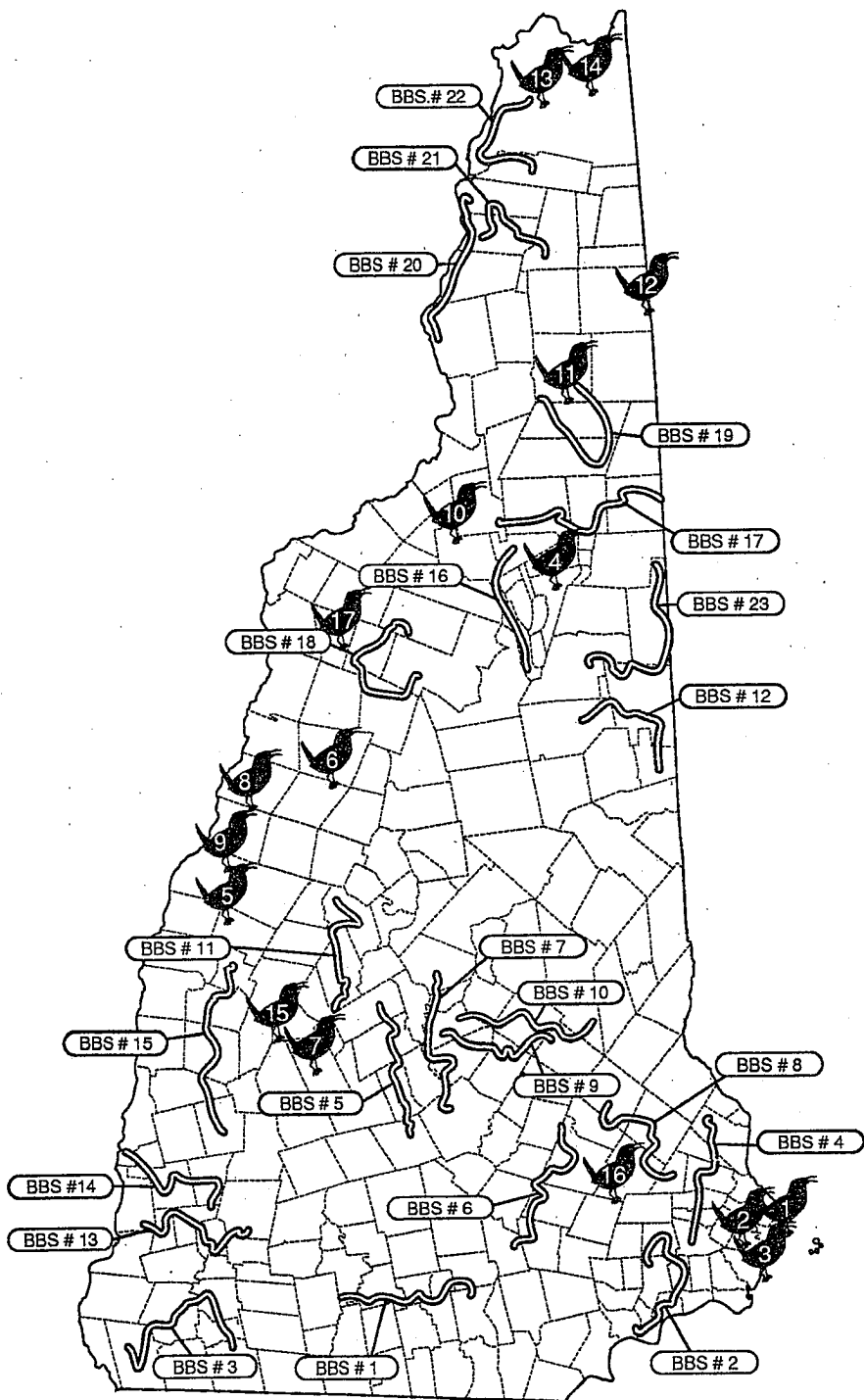
